### THE ISLES OF SCILLY AN INTRODUCTION

This itinerary as are all for sailing trips is, of course, dependent on the weather. Many of the anchorages and harbours amongst the Isles of Scilly are very weather dependent and whilst we have taken care to choose stopping places and routes that are best in the "expected "weather as you know it is impossible to predict the weather in the UK, so we will need to be somewhat flexible in our plans.

The Isles of Scilly (which is the preferred name, rather than 'Scilly Isles' or 'Scillies') lie 28 miles from Lands End - the most South-Westerly point of the UK.



Scilly consists of 5 inhabited islands; <u>St. Mary's</u>, <u>Tresco</u>, <u>St. Martin's</u>, <u>Bryher</u> and <u>St Agnes</u>, with a combined population of about 2000, and many smaller uninhabited islands and rocky islets.

The islands' position produces a place of great contrast - the ameliorating effect of the sea means we rarely have frost or snow, which allows local farmers to grow flowers well ahead of those on mainland Britain while the exposure to the Atlantic winds means spectacular winter gales lash the islands from time to time.

This is reflected in the landscape, for example on Tresco where the lush Sub-Tropical Abbey Gardens on the sheltered Southern end of the island contrast with the low heather and bare rock sculpted by the wind on the exposed Northern end.

Scilly has been inhabited since stone-age times and its history has been one of subsistence living until this century with people living from the land and the sea. Farming and fishing continues today, but the main industry now is tourism. Obviously, the sea has always played a huge part in Scillonian history but it was in the nineteenth century that Scilly had its maritime heyday. Beaches which are now enjoyed by sunbathers were then factories for shipbuilding, the harbours now full of pleasure boats were once packed with local and visiting fishing and trading boats.
